Day 1

Day 2

Time to paddle! Rent a kayak at Town Creek and enjoy a slow and easy paddle along the shoreline. You will be able to see all types of wildlife on land and in the water. Deer will be plentiful at Lake Guntersville State Park. Watch over your head to see breathtaking bald eagles. It's guaranteed that you will see fish jumping in the water too.



Grab a picnic basket! You will want to have a picnic at Guntersville Dam to watch the water rushing through the gates. Cafe 336 in downtown Guntersville has delicious chicken salad and soups that will fill you up. Take a hike on one of their trails afterward too!

Learn some history! Drive to the Guntersville museum to learn about the history that surrounds the lake. Learn about the Native Americans who once called this place home. You can also learn all about the flooding of the lake from TVA. You will leave with a new appreciation of Lake Guntersville.
